# **PASTOR'S PEN**

# Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe

I hope everyone had a wonderful thanksgiving and had time to be with family and friends. I hope you also ate too much and splurged a bit and just had some fun! These are the moments that make up our lives and I think we're called to savor these precious times and take time to enjoy the goodness around us.

The Solemnity of Christ the King marks the end of the church year. Next Sunday begins the season of Advent and it all begins again. It seems like it was just a hot summer day in July a few days ago and now we've already finished our turkey dinners and are heading for Christmas at full speed! These holidays are wonderful and fun and exhausting. For me, time just seems to be going by so very fast. I remember older people saying that to me when I was young and I never believed them. Now I do. It seems I was in my 20s a few days ago and now people look out for this old man and ask if I need assistance! How dare them! I'm still a young kid in my own little mind!
