PASTOR'S PEN

Seventeenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Didn't we have a wonderful time at Mass last Sunday with the children from Vacation Bible School here to lead us in song and prayer? Again, thank you to Joni Scott and all of the volunteers from the Kitchen cooks to the teachers and teacher's aides to all who had any part in making the two weeks a grand experience for the children. I was able to see the crowd before they left for Cedar Point on Thursday and you could feel the excitement. It truly makes my day when I see the children having a great time. So, thanks to all who made it possible.

Today's Gospel shows Jesus teaching the disciples how to pray. The "Our Father" has become such a common prayer that sometimes we gloss over the words we are praying. A few weeks ago, the group from St. Charles who are preparing for baptism went over this prayer with Sr. Judy line by line. The part they and all of us decided was the hardest was the line, "and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us." It really is an indictment on the way we forgive others. Lord, forgive as we forgive. Yikes, it would be a lot easier to say "Lord, help us to forgive as you have forgiven us." It's much like the scripture that says "with the measure (of mercy) which you measure will be measured back to you." I know the times I have not been forgiving or merciful and if that becomes the yardstick by which I am forgiven, I don't have a chance.

The reminder today is that forgiveness is freedom and when we carry all kinds of resentments and hurt within us, we only hurt ourselves and make our lives miserable. I know when I see the Lord, I will need a lot of mercy and forgiveness and so I don't have the luxury of holding back my forgiveness from those who have hurt me. I also know that forgiveness and healing from deep hurts don't just come because we want them to go away but they are wounds that can gradually heal if we tend to them. Maybe this week we can just look at the pain and hurts that hamper us from forgiving and invite Christ into those sacred wounds. The "Our Father" is not just a praise of God in heaven but it's a tremendous challenge to our lives and our brokenness. As we take each other's hands this week to pray this prayer, may we hear the challenge to begin to let go of some bitterness and hurt that may have been festering in our hearts for many years. Forgive us, Lord, and help us always to work at forgiving others. May God open our hearts this week to his love and forgiveness so that we might be able to bring forgiveness into our relationships!

The Fund Raising Committee

The Finance Council wants to report to the parish on the status of Offertory collections as we finish the fiscal year. The Archdiocese is on a fiscal year of July 1 to June 30 and not the calendar year.

Offertory Collection budget: \$155,000

Actual Offertory Collection: \$141,439

Amount Short of Budget: \$13,561

While we are short of our budget, if you look over 52 weeks, we are only short \$260 each week. Maybe we could all think about whether or not a small weekly increase is something we could do. A big "THANK YOU" to everyone for your generosity! Know that it is greatly appreciated!
