PASTOR'S PEN

Eighteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Our readings today remind us that much of the things we go after or aspire to in our lives are "fluff." They are vanities of all types and the call is to be wise with the time of our lives We are here for a short moment Even 100 years is but a speck in the universe. So what are we worried about this week? What plans are we making that we think are so important? Who have we overlooked this week because we were too busy with the "important" stuff of our lives?

As I've said so many times and continue to remind myself each time, we think we are really in control. We, like the man in the gospel, make great plans and store up all kinds of things thinking we are going to live forever. It's only when we are hit with a crisis or struck down by a tragedy that we realize there are very few things we can control and really only a few things that are truly important. It's the people in our lives and not the "stuff" that really matters. When we're long gone, they will not remember what kind of car we had or whether our house was always neat or whether we were a great cook or had a tremendous career or what degrees we received or whether we were too fat, too thin, too short or too tall, athletic or a couch potato, etc. They will remember the moments we gave them which touched their hearts. We never know when all the moments will be over and I would rather spend my moments enjoying the people I love even if all the "important" chores don't get done!!
