PASTOR'S PEN

Twenty-second Sunday in Ordinary Time

Well it's another Labor Day weekend! Where has the Summer gone? Labor Day has never been one of my favorite holidays as it always marked the beginning of school, the end of summer and little to look forward to, except the grind of ordinary life again. It always made sense to celebrate labor on this weekend as it felt like this was the call to come back from summer vacation and return to work or school or anything else that was not as fun as being on vacation!

Each year we stop to consider the work we are about (i.e., our jobs, our careers, our vocations, our missions in life, etc) For many of us, our day to day work may seem like a drudgery and a tremendous burden to carry. We may not all have the most fascinating jobs or ones we would have chosen but they have become part of the fabric of our stories. They are the reason we get up in the morning and although they may not provide us with the resources to get everything we want, we are usually able to get all that we need. Many of our jobs bring meaning to our lives and build our self-esteem.
